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## A Brief Peek at the 2005 Annual Meeting from the Program Committee

For many of us, one of the great pleasures of each academic year is the ACNP Annual Meeting in December. We eagerly anticipate the gathering and the promise of presenting, hearing about and discussing with our colleagues cutting edge science related to neuropsychopharmacology. While there may

be other specialty meetings more closely related to our individual scientific endeavors, the ACNP represents the “best of the best” across many interrelated fields. Plus, the meeting is fun!

Thanks to the leadership of this year’s President, Danny Weinberger, the 2005 Annual Meeting should be no exception on either account. We have a crowded and wonderful program ranging from the Presidential plenary entitled “The Complexity of Complex Genetics: Beyond Genes and Environment” to a slate of 49 panels, 2 Hot Topic sessions and 3 poster sessions with over 500 posters. We also have a special Teaching Day (“Total Glia”) set up by our President-Elect, Ken Davis, and a very topical Distinguished Lecture by Ron McKay (“Stem Cells Today and Tomorrow”). While the days will be busy as usual with lectures, panels and posters, the number of evening workshops has been dramatically reduced by virtue of a decision by our representative Council to protect more time at night for casual conversation over dinner with friends and colleagues.

Before describing the types of panels, I want to thank my Co-Chair, Larry Siever, and the rest of the 28 members of the Scientific Program Committee who have worked very hard to choose the best science we have to offer. To give you a sense of the competition, we had over 140 excellent submissions for only 49 available panel spots. For the many of us who were disappointed that our individual submissions were not accepted, I can assure you that the Program Committee worked assiduously to be fair and balanced in the selection process. Nonetheless, we welcome suggestions from anyone for how this process can be improved in the future given the competitive constraints.

As for the science that was selected for the panel presentations, you will be pleased to find panels involving schizophrenia, mood/anxiety disorders and alcohol/drug abuse areas are heavily represented throughout the program with 10, 8 and 9 sessions, respectively. Other well represented topics include signal transduction, imaging, development and aging, each with three or four panels. Individual sessions on synaptic plasticity, animal models and cognition, whole genome association studies, immune mediators and brain development, computational modeling and dopamine, medial temporal lobe, (*continued on page 2*)

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serotonin receptor subtypes, Tourette's syndrome and glutamate receptor agents round out the remainder of the panel presentations. The Hot Topic sessions have also become extremely competitive in recent years. This year, we have 171 submissions for just 20 available talks, and the arduous review process is continuing even as this note goes to press so that we can give you the freshest and most interesting new data.

The bottom line is that the Program Committee is very proud to have participated in the building of your 2005 Annual Meeting in Hawaii. We are especially grateful to Kathy Latimer of the ACNP Executive Office and the rest of the staff for their tireless assistance in keeping the process organized along the way. The science you will experience at the meeting is diverse, dynamic and selected to reflect the best of what the College has to offer this year. We all look forward to seeing you in Hawaii and hope you enjoy the meeting.

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## Incoming Secretary

Once I figure out what that means, I will then need to determine how to make it happen. Explicit in Danny's words is the need for the Secretary to be aware of the views of the membership on important issues so as to relay them to Council. I have never been a fan of surveys to obtain such information as the response rate is usually quite low. The danger, then, is making policy that is not necessarily based on the views of the majority and/or



meaningful discussion. Any thoughts as to how I might best carry out this responsibility would be greatly appreciated.

Absent creative suggestions, we may have to resort to surveys, at least initially. Certainly, the membership is welcome to voice their views to me via email that will be kept confidential and transmitted to the Executive Director, Council, as well as chairs of various committees when appropriate. I would also hope that the membership will be responsive to my choosing them at random to provide feedback on a wide range of issues such as meeting venue, publications, COI, media interface with ACNP, etc. I intend to talk with many of you in Hawaii about this and other issues so as to make my tenure effective.

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## A New Financial Plan for ACNP

In the Strategic Plan developed by Council and other senior ACNP members in 2004 a strategy that is central to the success of the overall goals and objectives of the College is to codify and manage the relationship between ACNP and its supporting corporations to eliminate either real or perceived conflicts of interest. Two major initiatives have been implemented to carry out that strategy. One is discussed in another article in this Bulletin, the development of a Code of Conduct for ACNP Supporting Corporations. The other is a dramatic change in the total financial support of the College that comes from pharmaceutical companies.

Council charged the Finance Committee this year to produce a plan that will reduce revenue from pharmaceutical companies to less than fifty percent of the total revenue of the College. Over the past five fiscal years, fees and contributions from pharmaceutical companies have accounted for as much as seventy-two percent of the College revenue, and have averaged sixty-three percent of total revenue. The Finance Committee presented a plan to Council in its summer meeting that will reduce revenue from pharmaceutical companies in total real dollars as well as in the percentage of total College revenue. Council believes this plan can be achieved over the next three years, and when fully accomplished will bring the percentage of pharmaceutical company revenue down to approximately thirty-seven percent of total College revenue. There are three major components to the financial plan as approved by Council. The first component of the plan is to lower the amount of revenue from supporting corporation fees and contributions. To accomplish this, effective in 2006 we will combine the supporting corporation sustaining fees and individual corporate representative dues into (continued on page 3)

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one sustaining fee payment that will be a lower total amount than has been charged in the past. This will lower the total amount of fees and dues paid by supporting corporations.

We will also restrict supporting corporation grants to specific programs such as research fellowships or specific educational programs. The amount of the grant in support of such a program cannot exceed the actual cost of the program. We will not accept contributions that support the operational budget for the College. This will reduce the total revenue from pharmaceutical companies by over forty percent.

The second major component of the plan is to increase the non-pharmaceutical company revenues of the College. Beginning in 2006, Council will raise the annual meeting registration fee by \$150 for members, \$200 for non-members, and \$75 for accompanying persons. The new registration fees will be \$550 for members, \$800 for non-members, and \$150 for accompanying persons. Effective in 2006, Council will also raise member dues by \$50 to a total of \$450 per year. Dues include a subscription to the Journal. These changes will increase non-pharmaceutical company revenue by approximately thirty-four percent. Council is also looking for additional ways to increase other existing sources of revenue, such as royalty income, and is looking for creative new sources of income as well.

The net effect of the changes described above will be to reduce the total amount of College revenue, therefore the third major component of the new financial plan is to reduce the overall expenses of the College. Council will be looking at all programs of the College and carefully evaluating them in terms of their cost-benefit ratio. The financial plan presented by the Finance Committee has recommended ways to reduce expenses by more than fifteen percent over the next three years. This will involve trimming the overhead expenses of the College, reducing some of the expenses of the annual meeting, and eliminating or reducing some of the public education and advocacy efforts of the College that seem to have a high cost to benefit ratio. Council has adopted those plans, but will continue to evaluate expenses of the College carefully on an ongoing basis in order to achieve even more savings.

Council is grateful, as we believe the membership will be, to the Finance Committee for their hard work in developing this financial model. This plan reduces the College's dependence on pharmaceutical company funding, and when combined with the proposed Supporting Corporation Code of Conduct described in this Bulletin and other firewalls already in place, we believe it represents a major step in reducing any perceived corporate influence or conflict of interest.

## **ACNP Code of Conduct for Sustaining Corporations and Corporate Representatives – Setting the Standard for Ethical Conduct**

The ACNP is planning a process to codify its relationship with the pharmaceutical industry in such a way that ensures transparency, protects scientific integrity, and helps to bolster public confidence in the scientific research enterprise. During the deliberations that went into the development of the ACNP Strategic Plan, some participants argued that ACNP, like other academic societies, should develop an approach to its relationships with pharmaceutical companies that would help to restore public confidence in clinical research and the clinical research community. These views were echoed throughout the strategic planning process, including input secured from the entire membership. As one of its first steps following the adoption of the strategic plan, the ACNP Council agreed to codify the relationship between ACNP and its supporting corporations in such a way as to serve as a model for positive, collaborative relationships between industry and academic societies, and to ensure that the public interest is served in these relationships. Council charged the Liaison Committee with Governmental Agencies and the Pharmaceutical Industry (Liaison Committee) with developing recommendations regarding the following directives from the ACNP Strategic Plan:

- Define conflict of interest and develop guidelines emphasizing transparency and accountability for the management of possible or perceived conflict of interest.
- Develop and codify the relationship between the College and industry, including methods of ensuring compliance.
- Manage the relationship between ACNP and pharmaceutical companies so as to eliminate conflict of interest or the appearance of conflict of interest.

The ACNP Liaison Committee met in Washington on March 14, 2005 for a discussion on a wide range of issues related to the College and its relationships with industry. The Committee noted the firewalls already in place to protect the College and its meeting from real or perceived industry influence and/or conflict of interest. For example, supporting corporations and their designated representatives are not allowed to vote on any ACNP matter that is submitted to the membership; nor are they allowed to attend ACNP Council meetings, Program Committee meetings, or any other official ACNP meetings in which decisions are made regarding College policy, about the content of the ACNP Annual Meeting, or about the content of any official College publication; nor are they allowed to serve in an official capacity on any ACNP committees.

However, to further ensure that the relationship of the College to industry meets the highest ethical standards, a sub-committee of ACNP members and corporate representatives was appointed following that Washington meeting to draft a Code of Conduct for these companies and their representatives. A draft document was prepared by the sub-committee and, after review by the full committee, was presented to Council for its review and approval on July 6, 2005. (continued on page 4)

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Council approved the document as drafted and returned it to the Liaison Committee to pursue its endorsement by the supporting corporations. During the coming year, the Liaison Committee has plans to collect feedback from our supporting corporations, refine the Code as appropriate, develop procedures for ensuring compliance, and to present a final draft to Council for approval. The Committee hopes to secure a grant from the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) / Office of Research Integrity (ORI) (William Carpenter, Principal Investigator) to support this effort. The resulting Code will then be offered as a model to AAMC for the ways in which academic societies can make their relationships with pharmaceutical companies more transparent, accountable, and consistent with the public interest.

Members of the College are invited to offer your comments and suggestions regarding the Code of Conduct for Supporting Corporations. - How to work effectively with the media
- How to prepare for a media interview
- How to tailor your message to your audience and "stay on message" in any kind of interview
- Presentation tips
- How to effectively communicate nonverbally

"The media relations workshop is a great session for any researcher who needs to respond to requests for media interviews," said Ellen Frank, ACNP Council and Public Information Committee member. "You'll learn how to answer any reporter's question effectively, which will help to prevent your comments from being taken out of context."

The session will focus on several key topics that are particularly relevant to our members. However, the skills you learn will be useful regardless of the topic of your future interviews. You'll also receive a

media training handout with tips and other materials that you can use to prepare for interviews in the future. This session will be both informative and fun, and we encourage everyone to attend!

Fellowship Start Date: **July 1, 2006**

The Paul Janssen Fellowship is awarded to an outstanding young physician-investigator proposing novel translational research in the field of neuroscience as it relates to psychiatric disease and medicine. The Paul Janssen Fellow will be assigned both a basic scientist mentor and a clinical investigator mentor from the faculty at Columbia University to serve as joint mentors. The fellow will take a basic observation made by the basic science mentor and apply it to the study of disease or treatment with the clinical research mentor.

**Eligibility:** Candidates from the international neuroscience community, holding an M.D. or an M.D./Ph.D. degree, and preferably having completed initial fellowship research training, are invited to apply. Fellows at Columbia University or the New York State Psychiatric Institute/RFMH are encouraged to submit applications.

**Funding:** The award provides a stipend, commensurate with experience, as well as \$25,000/year for research costs. The stipend provided may require supplemental funding by the mentors.

**Length of Fellowship:** Up to two years.

**Initial Application Process (to be submitted by November 30, 2005):** The following should be provided in 12 point font (or larger) with a minimum of one-inch margins: 1) Face page letter identifying applicant and a brief description of previous training in medical research, previous research interests, current position and future research interests. 2) Front two-pages of the NIH biosketch (sections A & B only). 3) Copies of letters of support/reference from at least three current or previous mentors.

## ADAA Announces Awards Program Call for Applications

Silver Spring, MD (October 2005) – Application are available online for the Anxiety Disorders Association of America (ADAA) Annual Awards Program. The ADAA provides awards to stimulate new investigators, fund research of junior faculty and develop the professional careers of those interested in anxiety disorders.

The awards will be presented at the 26<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference, March 23-26, 2006 at the Hyatt Regency in Miami, Florida. More than 100 travel awards and research grants have been given since 1998. During this time, the ADAA has provided more than \$1.5 million in funding for training and research projects.

### 2006 AWARDS PROGRAM

#### **Career Development Travel Award**

Deadline: November 30, 2005

ADAA will present up to 10 awards for \$1,200 each to individuals to attend and present a new research poster at the ADAA Annual Conference. This award is intended for new professionals and graduate students with career interests in fields related to anxiety disorders, such as basic and clinical neuropsychopharmacology, clinical psychology, genetics, neuroimaging and epidemiology. Awardees receive complimentary registration to ADAA's Annual Conference and the Satellite Scientific Research Meeting; complimentary one-year ADAA membership; peer review of abstract to be published in the *Journal of Depression and Anxiety Disorders*; and complimentary registration to attend the annual meeting of either the AABT or ACNP and present a poster.

Applicants may be Ph.D.-level scientists who have received their doctorates or completed a post-doctoral fellowship (whichever occurred last) within the past three years; physician scientists who have completed their residency or research fellowship (whichever occurred last) within the past three years; psychiatric residents or graduate students in neuroscience, psychology, social work or other related fields.

#### **Junior Faculty Research Grant**

Deadline: December 15, 2005

ADAA provides up to two \$25,000 grants that are intended to provide partial salary support for junior faculty who are making the transition to independent investigator. The grants aim to increase the pool of independent investigators with interest and expertise in anxiety disorders research. Grantees will receive a complimentary registration to ADAA's Annual Conference and the Satellite Scientific Research Symposium; a travel stipend of up to \$1,000 to attend the meeting; and a complimentary one-year membership.

Individuals who have completed at least one year of a postdoctoral fellowship or post-residency research training by the time the grant is awarded are eligible to apply. Investigators who have achieved the academic level of associate professor or who are recipients of NIH/NIMH "K" or R01 grants are NOT eligible. Applicants must have a mentor or senior research collaborator who is an established investigator in anxiety disorders research.
